JOHN WESLEY FELLOWSHIP
Application Form

The applicant is requested to complete this form. Essay questions should be answered on separate paper. All information shared will be handled confidentially. **NOTE: All applications and supporting documentation must be postmarked by January 20th of each year.**

Essays and materials should indicate an understanding of the mission of the Fellowship, an emerging understanding of how the applicant will contribute to the needs of the church and her institutions, and the formation of students. In every class, the Foundation is looking particularly for people who will embody leadership skills as scholar-teachers. The application asks specific questions that focus on the importance of being a changemaker in one's vocation.

The idea of serving as a changemaker harkens back to the Wesleyan movement's emphasis on holding together the riches of Scripture and the classical Christian tradition while engaging in innovation to meet the challenges and opportunities of contemporary contexts. Given the changes in U.S. higher education and theological education in these first decades of the 21st century, we are looking for scholar-teachers who embody this commitment to traditioned innovation and are equipped to provide leadership for the renewal of the Church.

Applicants should ensure that the individuals they select as references can speak to the strength of the candidate for fulfilling the mission of the John Wesley Fellowship, including one's potential to be a "changemaker," as well as the strength of the applicant's academic ability. **Please see the form below to be used for reference letters.**

Prior to applying, candidates are encouraged to talk with current Fellows to gain a full understanding of the mission and fellowship of AFTE. While the Fellowship does provide scholarship support, it is much more than a scholarship program. It seeks to be an ongoing fellowship of scholars, pastors, bishops, administrators, and others who are providing complementary leadership in the renewal of the Church of Jesus Christ.

Ordinarily, we expect successful applicants to devote full-time to their studies. We consider exceptions on a case-by-case basis. We also expect that students will apply to the strongest doctoral programs in their field, and take into account the importance of theological formation in their studies regardless of their school or specific field. **Applicants are encouraged to contact the AFTE office via e-mail (info.afte@gmail.com) well before deadlines to discuss the schools to which they are considering applying and the reasons for those choices.**

Following the review of applications, semi-finalists will be chosen by the end of February. Semi-finalists are asked to attend an in-person interview, after which time the new class of Fellows will be selected and announced, usually by the end of April.

What are the roles of local congregations, seminaries, and colleges in church renewal? (3-5 pp.)
4. Describe your level of commitment to, and your present involvement in, the United Methodist Church (local and otherwise). How do you intend to use your gifts and academic expertise to witness for Christ and enrich the Church? (2-3 pp.)
5. Write a brief spiritual autobiography, including your present areas of growth and struggle. (2-4 pp.)

3. A copy of your GRE scores (**Code #1136 The GRE is required of all applicants**)
4. Reference Letters: We request that you submit five letters of reference: three from professors (one or more deans/administrators can be included in the list of three faculty), one from a pastor, and one from a layperson. In each case, please select people who know you well enough to be able to offer informed judgments about your strengths and weaknesses. Please distribute the form on the next page to each person whom you have asked to serve as a reference.
